Voter Guide

The measures on this year's ballot shape whether California invests in our communities - on housing, health care, schools, and a fair say in our democracy - or hands more power to those who already have it. Here's where CIPC stands, and why.



Proposition 1 Affordable Housing Bond

Creates a \$11.25B bond for multifamily housing, CalVet home loans & youth housing.



Proposition 2 Rainy Day Fund

Helps California build a larger reserve and protect core public services by changing the rules for the state's "rainy day" fund.



Proposition 3 Permanent High-Earner Tax

Makes the Prop 38 (2012) income tax funding schools and early childhood programs permanent.



Proposition 4 Public Campaign Financing

Levels the playing field for grassroots candidates by setting up public financing systems for state and local political candidates.



Proposition 5 Recall Election Reform

An updated recall process provides a greater amount of time for immigrant voters to access voter information in a variety of languages and to meaningfully engage in recall elections.



Proposition 39 Voter ID Mandate

Creates additional barriers to voting by requiring government-issued photo IDs and government verification of citizenship.



Proposition 40 Billionaire Wealth Tax

Creates a one-time 5% tax on billionaires' accumulated wealth to fund much-needed health care, food, and education programs.



Proposition 41 Costly Audit Mandate

Cancels out Prop 40's billionaire's tax by requiring costly state audits of programs funded by new taxes.



Proposition 42 Billionaire Tax Loophole

Makes it harder to create a wealth tax in California, which ultimately hurts all non-billionaires in the state, including immigrants.



Proposition 43 Higher Tax Threshold

Raises the vote threshold for local special tax measures from a majority to two-thirds — making it more difficult for communities to address budget shortfalls.



Proposition 44 Clinic Spending Mandate

Financially penalizes clinics if they spend resources on important staff and patient services, which threatens access to care for millions of patients.



Proposition 45 Weaken Environmental Review

Weakens environmental protections and reduces community input on polluting projects which disproportionately harm low-wage, immigrant communities.
